

Criminal Justice Associate of Arts Degree (60 credit hours)

2018-2019

The curriculum provides foundational courses in criminal justice and approximately one-half of the hours required for the four-year Bachelor of Arts degree program. The curriculum assumes proficiency in writing at the ENGL 1100 or 1110 level and in mathematics at the MATH 1000 level.

Major Requirements

30 credit hours from:

- BIBL 2000, Introduction to the Bible, 3 credit hours
- CRIM 2510, The Nature of Crime and Social Deviance, 4 credit hours
- CRIM 2520, Introduction to Criminal Justice, 3 credit hours
- CRIM 3110, Criminal Law and Process, 4 credit hours
- LART 1100, Liberal Arts Seminar, 2 credit hours
- POSC 2100, American National Government, 3 credit hours
- SOCI 2020, Social Problems, 3 credit hours

6 hours from additional CRIM courses.

12 -14 credit hours from the liberal arts program (see liberal arts requirement sheet), no more than one course from any one component, and no more than 4 hours from courses offered by the department.

Remaining hours from additional courses in any caption; no more than 31 hours from CRIM courses.

Students must also meet other graduation requirements as listed in the catalog.
