TUITION

Tuition for any course you are taking for graduate credit is estimated at \$485 per credit hour. When taking Dalcroze Eurhythmics for graduate credit, you will receive two hours of graduate credit, and the cost is \$970. If you take Dalcroze Eurhythmics for no credit the cost is \$750 (NO graduate credit). If you take Grant Writing for the Music Educator, Ukulele in the Music Classroom, or World Music Drumming & the Orff Schulwerk Process for graduate credit, you will receive one hour of graduate credit, and the cost is \$485. If you take Grant Writing for the Music Educator, Ukulele in the Music Classroom, or World Music Drumming & the Orff Schulwerk Process for no credit, the cost is \$360 (NO graduate credit). An on-campus materials fee of \$30 will be added to each on-campus course taken.

GRANT WRITING FOR THE MUSIC EDUCATOR | VIRTUAL

June 17-21, 2024 | 8:30 a.m.-11:30 a.m. EST

This course will focus on the intricacies of grant writing and overall funding for the music educator, while tailoring itself to each individual's needs for funding. Participants will have opportunities to locate funding sources, examine common expectations in proposal requests, create and/or modify pivotal statements that are generally requested in proposals, and establish personal objectives for proposal completion. Methods that can help educators become more dynamic in their writing and presentation of their proposals will both be discussed and practiced by participants, thus increasing their chances of writing successful proposals.



Ashleigh Lore is an award-winning educator and the 2022-23 Region 6 Teacher of the Year. She received her master's in music education from the University of Michigan and her bachelor's from Central Michigan University. She is Orff, First Steps in Music, and Google for Education certified. Ashleigh has earned more than \$1 million in grant and funding awards since 2013, and details her process in her first book, *The Music Educator's Guide to Grant Writing.* Ashleigh is the treasurer of the Michigan Music Education Association, president of the Mid-Michigan Orff-Schulwerk Association, and a member of the International Orff-Schulwerk Forum Salzburg finance committee. She teaches elementary music in mid-Michigan, serves the Lansing Symphony Orchestra as

their education and outreach coordinator, and is an independent educational consultant.

UKULELE IN THE MUSIC CLASSROOM | VIRTUAL

June 17-21, 2024 | 1:00 p.m.-3:00 p.m. EST

The ukulele is a sought-after addition in the elementary music classroom. Strategies are presented to be ready for class use, while also studying underlying concepts that enable the design of a successful lesson sequence independently. Designed for teachers of all ability and experience, this professional development experience seeks to connect established pedagogical knowledge and the ukulele. Explore how to teach the ukulele, while also learning how to play. More than just a presentation of activities, this clinic aims to facilitate professional development discussion that is meaningful and valuable to each participant. The class will meet synchronously from 1-3 p.m. Students will also attend a 30-minute private lesson sometime during the week.



Lorelei Batislaong is an associate professor of general music education at the Conservatory of Music at Baldwin Wallace University. She previously taught undergraduates at the University of Texas at Austin and University of the Incarnate Word, as well as elementary music for 14 years. She received a bachelor's degree in music education from Southwest Texas State University and a master's in instrumental conducting from Texas State University. She is obtaining her doctorate in music and human learning from UT Austin. Lorelei is an active national and international clinician, presenting workshops in music learning and teaching. She has served on the board of trustees and chaired the diversity and equity subcommittee of the AOSA and is the state director of the Texas affiliate of the National Association for Music Education.

Lorelei currently serves as the deputy director and lead editor of Decolonizing the Music Room, a non-profit organization working to amplify the voices of black, brown, indigenous, and Asian people in music education. She is the co-author of *Elemental 'Ukulele: Pathways and Possibilities*.

DALCROZE EURHTHMICS: DISCOVERING THE RHYTHM WITH

YOU | BEGINNING AND INTERMEDIATE

June 24-28, 2024 | 8:30 a.m.-3:30 p.m.

These beginning and intermediate workshops will look at the elements of music through kinesthetic awareness. Participants will be actively engaged in music-making through movement — connecting the brain to the body, singing, and improvisation. While this workshop is primarily for the general music classroom, transfers will be made for the choral and instrumental classroom as well. Handouts and additional examples will help teachers take these ideas to their classrooms. Please come wearing loose, comfortable clothing, jazz shoes, or bare feet, and be ready to feel the joy of music. This year's featured faculty are Dr. David Frego and Dr. Marla Butke. Together, they authored *Meaningful Movement: A Music Teacher's Guide to Dalcroze Eurhythmics*, published in 2016, which will be the required book for the workshop, and *Dalcroze Eurhythmics in the Choral Classroom*.



Dr. David Frego is the director of the Pennsylvania State University School of Music and past president of the American Eurhythmics Society. As a Master Teaching Artist in Dalcroze Eurhythmics, he presents workshops and training sessions around the globe. He is dedicated to making eurhythmics accessible to general music specialists. His other interests include dance philosophy and the application of purposeful movement to those affected by post-traumatic stress.



Dr. Marla Butke directs the women's chorale at Otterbein University and teaches choral methods at Capital University. She holds degrees from Miami University, Wright State University, and The Ohio State University. She is a Master Teaching Artist with the American Eurhythmics Society, serves as the president of the board of AES, and is on the board of the Ohio Choral Directors Association.

WORLD MUSIC DRUMMING & THE ORFF SCHULWERK PROCESS

July 1-3, 2024 | 8:30 a.m.-2:30 p.m.

World Music Drumming is a sequential student-centered curriculum that engages learners through hands-on experiential learning. As with the Orff-Schulwerk process, students learn through discovery, creativity, and active music-making. Using keywords such as "respect, listen, complement, cooperation, and teamwork," lessons are designed to build upon skills taught and reinforced, with each unit culminating in an ensemble and song. Teachers familiar with Orff-Schulwerk process will recognize many complementary ideas in the approach of this remarkable curriculum. In addition to introducing applications of World Music Drumming to participants, we will explore ways to create a rich and diverse music experience for your students by combining drumming with Orff instruments, recorders, movement, and ukuleles. This is a hands-on participatory session. No previous Orff-Schulwerk or World Music Drumming experience is required.



Paul Corbière has taught elementary general music for 30 years in Florida and Iowa, and is currently a 4th and 5th grade music teacher. Paul is a member of the World Music Drumming teaching staff and has been a featured clinician at a number of prestigious conferences. Paul is a consultant for the Just Play It! Classroom Harmonica Method, a classroom blues harmonica curriculum. Paul has authored several resources that feature ensembles for the general music classroom.
